Grade 4 Guest Lecture – Teeth and Oral Hygiene

We attended a guest lecture on 17th of December,2024. It was taken by a dentist. It was an amazing informative session on '**Our Teeth'**. I was thrilled to attend the lecture as it was very interesting and the doctor gave us a lot more information on our teeth. I am sharing my learnings from that session here, which I will keep with me for life time.

Teeth: Teeth are part of our digestive system. They break down food by crushing or cutting them before we swallow. Teeth look like bones but actually they are ectodermal organ like skin and our hair.



Number of teeth: - Most adults have 32 permanent teeth.

Children have 20 primary teeth between the age of 6 months old to 6 years old their baby teeth fall out and then the permanent teeth grow.

Types of teeth: - There are 4 types of teeth that have important role in our food digestion and the way we look.

<u>Incisors:</u> - Most visible teeth in our mouth. We have 4 incisors on the upper jaw and lower. 2 front teeth and the teeth on either side of them are incisors. These are sharp and flat teeth help to cut food when we bite.

<u>Canines:</u> - These are pointier than other type of teeth. These are beside incisors. They help in tearing food.

<u>Premolars:</u> - Next to canine teeth are the premolars. There are eight premolars. Four on the top and four on the bottom jaw. Premolars are bigger stronger and have ridges, which make them perfect for crushing and grinding food.

<u>Molars:</u> - Next to the premolars are the molars. There are twelve of these, six on top and six in the bottom jaw.

Structure of Teeth: - Our tooth consists of two main structures:

Crown - Part of our teeth that we see.

<u>Root-</u> Part of our teeth that holds it in our jaw and we can't see it because our gums cover it.

Our teeth have 4 main layers which includes: -

<u>Enamel-</u> Protective outer layer of each tooth, help our teeth from cavity/bacteria, hardest substance in our body.

<u>Dentine-</u> Underneath our enamel there is a layer of dentine and it protects the pulp.

Cementum-It covers our tooth root and help anchor our tooth firmly in our jaw.

<u>Tooth pulp</u>- Innermost layer of tooth, contains nerves, blood vessels and connective tissues.

Ways to keep healthy teeth: -

A proper oral hygiene is very much important to keep our teeth and gums healthy. We may do following things for healthy teeth: -

- Brush your teeth twice daily at least for 2 minutes.
- Use soft-bristled tooth brush and fluride tooth paste.
- Wash your mouth well after every meal.
- Visit the dentist every six months.
- Avoid eating sugary snacks and drink/soda which can hurt your teeth and cause tooth decay.
- Take a balanced diet, must include milk as it is rich in calcium which helps to make your teeth strong.

After that session I concluded the information given by the dentist that our teeth are essential part of our digestive system and for living a healthy life our digestion should be good which can not happen without healthy teeth. With proper care and maintenance our teeth can be with us well for life time.
